Meeting Called to Order: 6:04 PM

Approval of Agenda: Motion to approve the agenda was made by Samantha, seconded by Rebecca.

Approval of Last Meeting Minutes: Motion to approve the January minutes was made by Samantha, seconded by Sarah.

Principal's Report:

- Land Acknowledgement
- Junior/Intermediate CYW on leave and currently filled with occasional staff until we find someone permanent
- Shade Shelter Facilities (Crista Hunt)
- Currently, they do not attend parent council meetings for playground inquiries. The best practice would be to gather and forward the specific questions to Principal, and then facilities can supply formal answers- which Principal can deliver at the meeting.
- The playground process is defined through Senior Administration, based on Ministry guidelines, so Facilities can't really speak on their behalf.
 - **Shade Shelter Facilities (Joseph Newberry)**
- In response to the parent council's question, a wooden outdoor shade shelter can typically last 20–30 years on average with regular maintenance and care.
 Other Key Considerations:
- Seasonal Weather Patterns:
 - Effective Months: From September to June, the most beneficial months for a shade shelter in Southern Ontario are September, May, and June, when the weather is warmer, and outdoor activities are more common.
 - Winter and Early Spring (October–April): During colder months, outdoor use is limited, and the demand for shade is minimal.
- Sun Angle, Time of Day, and Structure Dimensions:
 - Sun Angle:
 - In early fall and late spring, the sun is higher in the sky, particularly between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM, which coincides with peak outdoor activity times (e.g., recess and lunch breaks).
 - The shelter's 10-foot canopy and 20' x 30' size will cast a usable shadow primarily within its footprint during these hours.

■ Early morning (before 10:00 AM) and late afternoon (after 2:00 PM) will result in longer, more angled shadows, reducing the shelter's effectiveness directly underneath it.

Winter Months:

In winter, the sun is lower in the sky throughout the day, leading to longer shadows. While the shelter may still provide shade, its use would be diminished as students are unlikely to sit outside during cold temperatures.

Practical Use:

- Assuming students use the shelter during recess, lunch, or occasional outdoor activities, its effectiveness aligns closely with the midday hours when the sun is highest and temperatures are milder in the effective months.
- However, during the school year, shaded protection would realistically only be optimal during 20–30 days of the school year, primarily in September, May, and June, and specifically between 10:00 AM and 2:00 PM.

Conclusion: The shade shelter would provide effective shade for students under its canopy for **3–4 months** of the school year during warm-weather months, with its peak effectiveness limited to midday hours. Over the course of a year, it would likely provide optimal shade for **20–30 days** and primarily between **10:00 AM and 2:00 PM**, when the sun's angle allows for sufficient shadow coverage under the structure.

We have installed shade shelters across our schools but wanted you and your parents to be well informed as to what these structures cost and provide.

- Kent has signed with Edge Imaging for the upcoming 2025/2026 school year so this is an option for 2026/2027 school year (Council can vote at the beginning of the school year, first council meeting, October 2025, Edge vs. Lifetouch)

Positive School Climate Meeting

- Met on Monday, February 3, 2025
- Bullying prevention and intervention plan was created (on school website)
- Looked at data from school created survey
- Very positive students feel good overall
- Plan based on:
- Kindergarten: 11% said people were kind at school only sometimes, 26% reported that students were mean to them, of those 26% 50% said they were mean using words
- Primary: 51% said someone greeted them daily (staff was working on that last year should be better), 37% said when other students were mean they used their words, 12 % reported not feeling safe at school (washroom, school yard, school bus)
- Junior: 48% reported being verbally bullied, 13% reported not feeling safe at school (school bus, washroom, school yard)
- Intermediate: 49% reported being verbally bullied, 25% reported not feeling safe at school (lunchroom, school yard, neighborhood)
- Goals: to continue to promote an atmosphere of kindness, promote greeting each other (staff greet students but also students greeting students and students greeting staff), discuss and teach healthy relationship skills at all levels (verbal bullying could be lack of good conflict resolution), more reminders about less aggressive play on the yard)
